Stručná anotace:

Cílem pracovního listu je zvýšení čtenářské gramotnosti žáků formou testu a zároveň zopakování probrané slovní zásoby na téma Město. Jednotlivá cvičení testu jsou řazena od nejjednodušších cvičení zaměřených na rychlé čtení pro získání všeobecného povědomí o textu (tzv. skimming), přes cvičení zaměřená na důkladné čtení pro nalezení konkrétních informací (tzv. scanning) až po cvičení pro zopakování a rozšíření slovní zásoby. Pracovní list může být zároveň použit jako rozšiřující učivo k reáliím Velké Británie.
